Light Opera Works is currently taking series subscriptions, which run from \$47 to \$113. Individual tickets will range from \$21 to \$48 per show. Where can it Be

If you're stuck for a Christmas Gift for a G&S enthusiast, or just stuck for a Christmas Gift, The Best of Gilbert and Sullivan have another recording available. They always give a good show, even on tape, and while S/A Cole didn't like this one quite as much as their first tape (the singing is fine, but the place where it was recorded sounds "echo-y"), it does give a good overview of G&S. Songs on the tape include "We're called gondolieri/Thank you gallant gondolieri", "Time was when love and I were well acquainted", "When I was a lad", "Fair Moon, to thee I sing", "Never mind the why and wherefore", "Cheerily carols the lark", "The Sun whose rays", "Were you not to Ko-Ko plighted", "Here's a How-de-do", "Then one of us shall be a queen", "I once was a very abandoned person/My eyes are fully opened", "When first my old, old love I knew", "When you had left our pirate fold", "Take a pair of sparkling eyes", "Poor Wand'ring One", and "Once more gondolieri". Performers are Deborah Clague (soprano), Lorraine Daniels (mezzo), John Ayldon and Kenneth Sandford (baritones), Geoffrey Shovelton (tenor), and David Mackie (accompaniment). Cassettes cost \$11.50 (postage included), and can be ordered from *Nona M. Young; Box 330, RFD 1; Kingfield, ME 04947*. While I can't find an order blank to check this information, I made the check out to Deborah Clague, so chances are, you can do the same.
